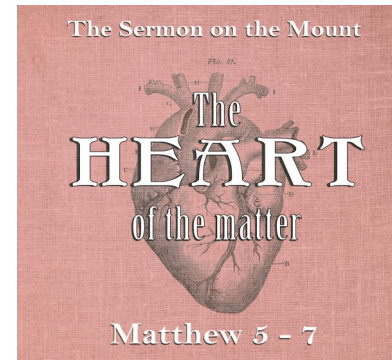
13. What have you learned from these three beatitudes?

### For the Week of May 2, 2021

#### Getting Started

1. What idea, thought or application caught your attention from this past Sunday's message?
2. Each beatitude is a statement and a promise. Why do you think Jesus used this format? (Matthew 5:3-9)
3. Kingdom is a theme of the Gospel of Matthew. How does the Gospel of the Kingdom relate to each of this week's beatitudes? (Matthew 5:7-9)
4. The first century Jewish person hearing this message had expectations of the Messiah. Do these beatitudes meet those expectations?

## Digging Deeper

5. Mike discussed a thread weaving the beatitudes together; how do they relate and build upon each other? (Matthew 5:7-9)

6. Each beatitude has promises associated with them—how would you summarize what is promised?
