"Humble yourself by relying on God to providentially honor you because God opposes the proud."

Overview

In this week's sermon pride was front and center. Pride was presented as something we can be blinded to in our life, even if everyone else can see it. The king's main man Haman had his pride on display throughout the story. We saw Haman filled with joy and gladness when his pride was satisfied and we saw his hatred and wrath when his pride was wounded. In contrast to Haman, Esther enters into the King's court at the opening of the story. Esther's humility enabled her to respond with courageous wisdom. As the narrative moved forward, we saw how Haman's pride was the foundation to his wicked plans.

In the next component of the story we saw God work through both the humility of Esther and the pride of Haman. God used all of the behavior in his story to accomplish his purposes. In this purpose God exalted the humility of Esther and Mordecai while shaming Haman. We walked away from this sermon thankful for God's sovereignty over all things and with the challenge to examine ourselves for the pride we can not see in ourselves.

 - a. What are the promises to the Jewish people through Abraham?
 - b. What is the significance of singular use of the word "offspring" or "seed" from the sermon?
- 3. How can you show humility in your home, neighborhood, or workplace? What steps can you to take to check your pride?
 - a. how could your humility open opportunities for you to proclaim the truth of Jesus with others?
- 4. Was there anything else that stood out in the sermon or the passage?
